

#### EDITION 1,000 7<sup>TH</sup> JANUARY 2021

**WOW!!!** The Macclesfield Newsletter has finally reached its 1,000<sup>th</sup> copy. I didn't think that when I started to volunteer in 1978 for the Newsletter sub-committee that I would still be associated with it at this wonderful milestone. It is also the longest running volunteer town newsletter in South Australia.

The first issue was printed on the 8<sup>th</sup> August 1977 at the Macclesfield Primary School on a spirit duplicator and was called the "Macclesfield Community News" (the word "community" was dropped from our name after a few years because we were being confused with the Community Association).

What a lot of people don't know is that the idea for a town newsletter was begun by Betty White who had seen one in another town and thought it was a good idea for our town, she talked about it with Rhonda Davis who then approached the School Welfare Club and a sub-committee was formed to get a town newsletter up and running.

However as time progressed, the sub-committee broke away from the school and became a committee in its own right. Since then we have been funded by the public, various clubs and organisations in the community and with advertising.

Eventually we were able to buy our own manual Roneo duplicator. This we used for quite a few years and the size of the newsletter and amount of copies printed grew.

We did the printing in various locations (Committee Members homes) until finding a permanent home at the former Catholic School building. Betty White joined the committee at a later date and is also still a member of the Macclesfield Newsletter committee to this day.

There have been many changes over the years. Back at the start the process used was to type and/or draw onto a stencil and then the stencil was put onto the drum of the duplicator, with the ink inside it.

The spirit duplicator at the school was a manual one so someone had to turn a handle for every sheet of paper that was printed. Considering that the first one was only 3 pages and I don't know how many copies were printed back then, it didn't take a long time to do though.

After a few years an electric duplicator was donated to us which made life a little bit easier as the newsletter had grown and we were printing up to 150 copies of a seven plus page newsletter every fortnight. We were the only town newsletter around that time that printed fortnightly (the others were monthly). Now we are also a monthly newsletter and maybe it is because I am older but that month seems to come around very regularly and I am not sure how we did it every fortnight for so many years.

Eventually with council grants and donations we were able to afford to buy more modern equipment which made it a lot easier to produce the newsletter. However the advances in the equipment have also made it "interesting" at times because of the differences in the types of equipment and programmes that we all now use.

There is not enough room or time to go into more details of our history but some of it can be read in the article "Thirteen Years On - A Retrospective" in the Jubilee Book that the Newsletter printed back in 1990.

There have been many people join the committee of the newsletter over the years, both women and men, and many more who volunteered, doing typing and helping on print days to collate the newsletter. But I think that a "VERY BIG THANK YOU" must also go to the Community of Macclesfield for your enduring generous support of the Macclesfield Newsletter. Not only with monetary donations but also for the articles and input into the continuation of the Macclesfield Newsletter.

However I don't think I will still be on the Committee when and if it reaches its next milestone of 2,000 copies.





#### Memories of Arend Vink. From Mike, friend, colleague, fellow Lion

(also long suffering labourer )

Anyone who has ever built a stone wall will know something of the problems involved, you try six pieces in the same spot but none of them seem to fit, so you go to trim one but it breaks in completely the wrong spot, it's all very daunting. Now I've helped Arend with quite a few walls over the years but he never seemed to have any such problems, size up the gap, pick up the right stone plonk it in no worries, if not quite there a couple of swipes with the hammer and it would fit perfectly. Now I'm not sure whether this came from years of experience or just natural talent, probably both, but I know that this positive approach and self confidence was a part of his character that showed through in everything he did in life. Daunted he never was!

I first knew Arend when he and Ria joined the Lions club at the same time as Eileen and myself back in 2003. Right from the start he became one of the major driving forces when it came to fund raising and work in the community. Because of his local knowledge and contacts we were always busy building fences, paving verandas, garden walls all sorts of small jobs for people who in turn would donate to the club. At shed sales he was in his element as he loved the wheeling and dealing, also the many BBQs at clearing sales etc. Over the years he was responsible for raising thousands and thousands of dollars for the many causes Lions support.

You only have to drive around Maccy to see evidence of his building activities everywhere, many of the community jobs being done free of charge. Looking at the bigger picture wherever you go in Adelaide or around country S.A. you will find stone houses, blocks of flats and all sorts of buildings he's been responsible for over the years.

All the time we knew them while Ria was still alive, they were constantly fostering children for Anglicare, and such was their generous nature that those kids always had the best of everything they could provide in the way of clothes food education and care.

Now I know Arend wouldn't mind me saying that he was not aiways the easiest person to get along with, he didn't suffer fools and always said exactly what was on his mind. I often used to tell him off for being so bossy with people who were after all mostly volunteers, his answer was usually "well if they can't do the job they shouldn't be here", yes, well he was never cut out to be a diplomat, but he certainly got things done. We had plenty of disagreements over the years but never fell out, and we loved to sit and chat over a couple of beers.

Speaking of which, although he was a bit of a workaholic at times, he also knew how to enjoy himself as well. A few drinks in the hotel, a flutter on the horses (something else he was good at picking) a turn on the pokies, he was the only bloke I know who could spend a couple of hours in the pub and come out eight or nine hundred dollars better off.

Arend loved his garden and always had a great show of roses and tulips as well as a big vegetable garden and a wealth of knowledge on how to grow stuff, we often used to swap seedlings and plants which annoyingly grew bigger and better at his place than at mine.

It's been a shock to see someone who has always appeared to be virtually indestructible, go downhill so quickly, only three days before going into hospital Arend spent the day working at our bike show BBQ. Determined to do his bit, although I'm sure he didn't really trust us to manage it without him. So standing next to me serving up bacon and eggs, still telling me off for not putting on enough bacon or onions, me always saying not too much or we'll run out, eventually the lady who was helping us, who was new to the club said "What is it with you two old blokes, you never stop arguing". Well we had a good laugh as I told her not to worry we'd been playing this same old game for years. By the way we did run out of bacon in the end. The next day when I went round to see how he was, I should have guessed he'd already worked out how much extra we'd better order for next year.

So with all the different memories I have of our time together the picture that will probably stick in my mind will be of Arend, eighty odd years old, up on the scaffold with his old hat on, brick in one hand trowel in the other, saying something like "get the mixer going Mike, just time to do another load".

Sadly he's finished the last course!





#### **AUSTRALIA'S FLAG - "DID YOU KNOW"?**

- The Australian National Flag is the only flag to fly over an entire continent.
- The Australian Flag was the first national flag chosen in an open public competition.
- The prize for the design competition (two hundred pounds) was a substantial sum of money in those days representing four year's wages for an average worker.
- Given that there were 32,823 entries in the design competition, and the 'Australian' population was estimated to be around 3.6 million in 1901; an equivalent response from today's population would amount to over 199,000 entries!
- Arranging the 32,823 entries for display at the Royal Exhibition Building in Melbourne took eight weeks and it took the judges six days to inspect them all and choose the winning design.
- Entrants in the flag competition gave their imagination free rein: designs submitted featured "every kind of flora and fauna identifiable with Australia—sometimes all at once" (e.g. a kangaroo with six tails to symbolize the six states and native animals playing cricket with a winged cricket ball!)
- The winning design was unveiled by the Countess of Hopetoun (wife of our first Governor-General) at a ceremony held at the Royal Exhibition in Melbourne on 3rd. September, 1901. (In 1996 Governor-General Sir William Deane officially proclaimed 3rd. September as "Australian National Flag Day" 'to commemorate the day in 1901 on which the Australian National Flag was first flown'.)
- Two out of the five prize-winners in the 1901 flag design competition were teenagers (in fact, only one of the winners was aged over 40).
- The Southern Cross (formerly known as "Crux Australis") is a constellation that can be seen only in the night skies of the Southern Hemisphere. The individual stars are named by the first five letters of the Greek alphabet in order of brightness (clockwise from the bottom star) Alpha, Beta, Gamma, Delta, Epsilon.
- The Southern Cross has a very significant status in Aboriginal mythology (e.g. as part of the legend of Mululu of the Kanda tribe).
- The Australian National Flag was raised for the first time at an Olympic Games in 1908 (London), celebrating a win for Australia in Rugby Union at that time an Olympic event.
- The Australian National Flag is raised every morning at the school in Villers-Bretonneux in France, in memory of the thousands of Australian casualties incurred in liberating their village in 1917 (during the first World War).

The committee approved the installation of fly screens over the kitchen louvre windows and are looking to lay gravel down the driveway so that this area could possibly be used for outside dining at future markets.




The MCA will once again subsidise the cost of the sound system to be used at Carols and will also run the refreshment stall serving tea, coffee, hot chocolate and cake.





#### **QUICK & EASY PIZZA**

#### **PIZZA Pastry**

2 cups S.R. flour, 1 cup plain flour,  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup of olive oil (or any cooking oil), about 1 cup of milk.

Stir flours together, mix oil and milk and add to flour, mix all together with a knife. Knead on a board,( no flour is needed ). Pat dough into a round shape, put onto a well oiled pizza tray or oven tray, and press out to the size required making sure the edges are raised a little. Lightly brush oil all over before spreading with your favourite filling. Bake in oven at about 450° (Elect) for 30 - 35 mins.

PIZZA Topping Any filling may be used, it depends on your family's likes.

Line bottom of dough with slices of cheese, mix together two small or 1 large tin of tomatoes (fresh tomatoes may also be used) 1 chopped onion, 1 teaspoon oregano and a little sugar. Boil all together for about 10 minutes and strain liquid off if too runny. Spoon over the sliced cheese then add more sliced cheese and any sausage eg Kabana, mettwurst etc. Some anchovy sauce or real anchovies, and sliced olives if you like them. Garlic can also be added to the tomato mixture and ham & pineapple over the cheese and tomato is another alternative. Mozzarella cheese combines best with the other flavours and is available in most deli's.

#### **CORNFLAKE GINGER CRISPIES**

#### **INGREDIENTS**

½ cup margarine

½ cup castor sugar

1 egg

1 tsp ground ginger

1 cup S R flour

½ cup finely chopped crystallised ginger approx 2 cups corn flakes lightly crushed



#### **METHOD**

Mix margarine and sugar together in a bowl, add ginger and egg, blend in flour and chopped ginger.

Roll teaspoons of mixture in corn flakes and place on an ungreased baking tray, allow room for spreading.


Bake at 160C for 12-15 minutes or until golden brown.
