

WEDDING ANNIVERSARIES



Joy Steer - A Tribute

Joy was born in Gillingham, Kent in 1937, only child to Ernest Henry Thomas Fever and Alice Mabel Fever. She enjoyed telling everybody that she shared her birthday on the 6th of June with the anniversary of D-Day, the turning point of WW11. She was two years old when war began and many of her early memories were associated with the war years. She remembers when her father received his call up papers and hearing the sirens warning of an air raid.

She lived with her Nanny and Grandad Pop in Chatham during the war so that her mum could continue to work. One of her happy memories was playing in the neighbours back garden. The garden had an air raid shelter and in one



corner, piles of tyres, planks, boxes and ropes. The spill tray of an old wooden roller mangle was always used as a piano and she and the other children played circuses, hide and seek and kick tin. She was eight years old on VE night and recalls it was the first time she had seen the streetlights on. At the age of thirteen she won a scholarship to Fort Pitt Technical School, a girls' school, which focused on preparing students for commercial work and nursing. Hers was the first year that had a class that all became teachers.

Joy enjoyed being a brownie and a guide and on her first camping trip she travelled in an open truck with the girls sitting around the edges and the luggage in the middle. During her teen years, the most important event of her life was 'The Friday Club', a youth group associated with the Methodist Church. They met on Friday nights, went to church together, socials and bible studies.

She also attended monthly London Philharmonic Orchestra concerts, with some of the group members. She attended Brighton Teachers Training College and her first teaching job was at the primary school she had attended as a child. This is where she met her friend Joan Hancock, who persuaded her to join the theatre group Kentish Players, where she met Philip.

Joy and Philip were engaged on her 21st birthday in 1958 and married on the 28th March 1959. They honeymooned in Seefield, Austria in the mountains above Innsbruck. Philips' school friend Malcolm married Joys' friend Joan and moved to Australia soon after. They suggested Joy and Philip also migrate and in 1962 Joy and Philip travelled by ship to Australia.

Joy taught 24 six year olds for an hour a day on board ship and after 4 weeks they arrived in Australia where Philip started work as a medical laboratory technician at Latrobe Valley Community Hospital in Yallourn, Victoria.

Joy and Philip lived in Yallourn opposite the croquet green and Joy became an avid croquet player. She continued to play croquet until her 70's. She and Philip moved to Peter Street, Morwell, Victoria in 1964. The next major event in Joys' life was the birth of her daughter Sarah-Jane in 1966 followed by the birth of her daughter Mary-Louise in 1968. Sarah recalls spending a lot of time at the croquet club in Yallourn collecting acorns and being spoilt by many adopted aunties and uncles while Joy played croquet.

Joy was an active parent at kindy and preschool and the costumes she made for her children were possibly her first foray into sewing. Sarah does remember wearing a costume to preschool made quite ingeniously out of crepe paper. The costume was not so ingenious when it ripped leaving her in her underwear! Joy sewed all her children's clothes and continued to sew her own clothing throughout her life.

Joy received her registration as a teacher in Australia in 1973 and after some relief teaching at various schools, she became a teacher at Morwell Park Primary School, even teaching her daughter May-Louise at one stage. While teaching, Joy met Kaylene Hams and Christine McDermott, now Christine Pearce, with whom she established long-term friendships. Christine recalls that her connection to Joy began over 40 years ago when she shared the classroom with her.

This was Christine's second teaching appointment and working with Joy who had distinct approaches to doing things was apparently quite an eye opener at times. Christine survived and even recently Joy would still proudly introduce her to other residents at Oakfield Lodge as her teaching colleague. After Christine married Brian and moved to Flaxley, Joy, Philip and her two daughters visited Christine and Brian on the farm during their annual holiday at West Beach Caravan Park. In later years Joy joined Christine, Brian and their children for many a Christmas lunch and took a great interest in the children's lives as they were growing up.

Joy continued her interest in guiding and ran a brownie pack in Morwell for many years, which was also attended by her children.

One of the highlights of Joy's life was her trip with her family for 6 months in 1978 to the UK and Europe. She introduced her children to their relatives overseas and certainly made sure Sarah-Jane and Mary-Louise didn't get out of any of their schooling having prepared daily lessons for them both. She even managed to find a piano in a hotel in Greece so Sarah-Jane could practice for her exams. Joy and Philip had attended classes prior to the trip to learn to speak the German language and Joy used this to full effect when lost in traffic. After being tooted by several cars, she got Philip to stop in the middle of the road, holding up all the traffic while she gained directions from the people in the car behind.

In 1991 Joy and Philip moved to Macclesfield where they lived very happily establishing a rambling native garden and becoming an integral part of the Macclesfield community. Joys' husband Philip passed away from cancer on the 14th of August 1992. Not long after, Sarah gave birth to Joys' first grandchild Nikki. Joy loved being a 'gran' and while visiting from Old, Sarah remembers her being so focused on introducing her new grandchild to everyone that she completely forgot to introduce her daughter!! In 1995 her daughter Mary-Louise gave birth to Joys' second grandchild Christie and shortly after Sarah gave birth to Joys' third grandchild, a grandson Taylor. Joys' final grandchild Lilly was born in 2002.

Joy loved to travel and went on many trips with Rufus Bus and Coach including a trip to the Eyre Peninsular, the Christmas Proms, the cherry farm and the South Australian Police Band at the Hopgood Theatre.

She travelled to Queensland every year to stay with Sarah, Doug, Nikki and Taylor. She loved attending various theatre shows that they were involved in, especially Cats, which she said was 'far better than the original London production'. Every year she attended a performance at the music conservatorium in Brisbane, where Taylor played the trumpet and took the opportunity to wander around open gardens and National Parks with Sarah who shared her passion for gardening and bushwalking.

Nikki recalls visiting Gran in South Australia where she saw her first Autumn leaves and both children enjoyed story time sitting each side of their Gran while she read to them before their bedtime.

Joy was involved in many community groups. She enjoyed having Erin, Christine and Brian's daughter, join her as a Brownie, when she started up and ran the Brownie Pack in Macclesfield. She belonged to the Mount Lofty Singers for a number of years and was an active member of the Echunga Uniting Church. At the church she particularly liked attending the Summer camps near the beach and had many close friends, such as Bron and Kym Anderson. Bron and Kym were consistent pillars of support for Joy, Sarah and Doug. Joy was delighted when flowers came from Kym, never Bron and likewise gifts such as Christmas decorations for her room were always from Doug rather than Sarah. Luckily Bron and Sarah graciously accepted this bias!!

In Macclesfield she was heavily involved in the community association, and is remembered for her dedication to the community. She was responsible for planting the beautiful Callistemons opposite Davenport Square in Macclesfield and for the original plantings and maintenance of the garden beds in the main street. She liked to keep Macclesfield neat and tidy and by the number of beer glasses in her house from the local pub she must have decided these needed collecting up as well.

Brian remembered Joy helping every year when drivers in the Adelaide Classic Car Rally stopped at Macclesfield for lunch. She would firmly direct drivers (many of whom were international drivers) to where they had to go for lunch and engage with them, which they found quirky, but entertaining. She told Sarah very proudly that she had been named by the drivers as the Macclesfield terrier. I'm not quite sure that this was a complimentary title.

On the 18th of February 2016 Joy started a new chapter of her life, becoming one of the first residents at Southern Cross Care, Oakfield Lodge. With the help of a wonderful group of friends, Joy who had been unwell for quite some time transitioned into residential care where her health improved significantly with a busy lifestyle and three meals a day (I don't think she ever missed dessert). Joy always turned up for meals accompanied by her little sacking pot of violets and her fly swat. Other residents would often remark 'here comes Joy, armed and dangerous'.

Bron, her husband Kym, Christine and Brian have continued to play an active role in Joys life and Sarah will always be grateful for the amazing support provided to both her and her mother particularly as she lives so far away in Queensland

Joy also had wonderful support from the team at Oakfield Lodge, especially the lifestyle co-ordinators Monique, Cassie and especially Kerry, who managed Joy brilliantly. Joy enjoyed Oakfield Lodge bus trips to familiar sites in the Adelaide Hills and further afield such as Adelaide Port River dolphins cruise. Sarah accompanied her mum on this day, and we have some great photos of Joy and Sarah poking their tongues out at the person taking their photos.

Joy attended the gym, opened the curtains in the loungeroom near her room every day and was according to her, solely responsible for most of the plantings in the gardens at Oakfield Lodge. She continued to garden and water the plants most days, feeding the chickens scraps. She named her favourite chicken 'Grizzleguts', talked to the guineapigs and appreciated it when people visited with their dogs.

She loved it when the children visited from the nearby school and was quite a popular resident. Joy provided a teacher with her favourite book 'Plop the owl who was afraid of the dark' and was then given a book filled with pictures of 'Plop' drawn by the children. One of the students wrote to Joy saying that she absolutely loved her amazing stories and her awesome dance moves! She wrote that the highlight of every second Tuesday was visiting Joy and that she was grateful for having met her.

Joy continued to live life to the full. Her final task on the day before she passed away was to assist Oakfield Lodge staff to categorise the DVD library next to the fireplace in the library. By all accounts she did a great job. In the words of a good friend 'there are numerous 'Joy' stories out there from anyone who encountered her. Mum was a character, but underneath that brusque manner, she was a caring and generous soul'.



Mount Barker District Council is changing its Ward structure this year. Some of the Options being considered are **likely to result in NO Councillors being elected from small towns** like Macclesfield, Meadows, Prospect Hill and Echunga.

The Macclesfield Community Association believes this would have a negative impact on our town. We want Councillors who live locally and understand our community. MCA wants a Ward structure that ensures small communities can have a voice on Council.

MCA has reviewed all 7 Options under consideration and can only support 2 of them. In our assessment, only Options 3 and 4 will provide a fair level of representation for Macclesfield and neighbouring small towns.

Due to population growth in the District, the way voters are represented MUST change at the next Council election (end of 2022).

Glimpses of the Past

Macclesfield's Crystal Lake Campsite

This follows an article in the October 2020 Newsletter about Macclesfield's historic Crystal Lake Swimming Pool. Both the swimming pool and the campsite were located on sections of Lord Robinson Park. The campsite was about 10 acres of land surrounding the pool and it was leased by the Youth Clubs Association in 1960 (The Assoc. was later called the South Australian Community Recreation Association or SACRA).

In 1960 the District Council of Meadows and the Youth Clubs Association signed an agreement that allowed the Club to lease the pool area for 21 years at 5 shillings a year providing they kept all buildings and all other improvements in good repair and condition at their own expense. The agreement also granted public access to the Lord Robinson Swimming Pool for swimming, other aquatic sports or recreation.

During the following years Youth Clubs added further buildings to the site including dormitories, a canteen and shower block, numerous sheds and a house. In 1975 a government grant was provided to enable Youth Clubs to develop a barbeque area, cement paths and to paint the exterior of the dormitories.

On the 14th August 1980, not long before the lease was due to expire, Meadows Council had the land 'dedicated for parkland purposes' defined as 'for use, benefit or recreation of the inhabitants of that town'.

Changes to the local government area in 1983 saw a portion of the District Council of Meadows assigned to the District Council of Mt Barker (DCMB) including the township of Macclesfield, surrounding parklands and Crystal Lake Camp.

Sadly, in November 1990 an eleven-year-old boy from Salisbury East Primary School drowned in muddy water at Crystal Lake. His absence was noticed at dinner time. There was a Coroners enquiry into the incident reported in the Advertiser (Advertisered2, 13/4/91 p10).

The DCMB managed the camp from 1983 until 1993 when they sold the assets; buildings etc. and leased the land to Phil and Chris Coleman. In 1997 Robert Carter purchased the assets and signed a ten-year lease on the campsite where he ran a camp for school and special interest groups. When the lease expired in 2007, he was given a 'holding lease' over the site which provided a month-by-month lease plan while the Council sought legal advice and examined the ramifications of his application for a new lease. In reviewing the existing lease arrangements, they noticed anomalies with respect to the lease, the boundary of the leased area and the status and ownership of the buildings.

To address and clarify these anomalies the Council set up a community engagement process. During a Community Forum held by the Council in February 2008 a major concern raised by the community was their limited access to the park and the river due to the area being fenced. Because the land had been dedicated for 'parkland purposes' in 1980 it was deemed to be unlawful to exclude the public and therefore granting a new lease would be contradictory to the dedication.

However, the Council resolved to seek re-dedication of the land so that a commercial lease of Crystal Lake Camp could legally take place. In August 2009 Council applied to the Dept of Environment and Heritage, to re-dedicate an area of the park for commercial lease. This area was considered to be the most attractive part of Crystal Lake and an ideal site for a camp.

In July 2009 the Lessee had written to Council to say that he found the short-term lease financially untenable as he couldn't guarantee any future campsite bookings beyond 30 days. He sought to be compensated for significant losses to his business and asked Council to purchase the buildings to clear the way for a future lessee. (Carter R 2009, Draft Crystal Lake Camp proposal)

Despite the Council offering several options to the short-term lease and a follow up letter, emails and phone calls, no response was received from the Lessee. It was then recommended that the Council terminate the current lease arrangement and give the Lessee four months' notice to vacate the site. (Council Agenda 2 August 2010)

With still no response, Council called for tenders for the 'Disposal of Surplus buildings and Assets' on the site. To protect against legal action Council sought court approval to gain 'vacant possession'.

Robert Carter who had been absent from the Crystal Lake site returned and sought legal advice and representation regarding his position. The legal issues between the Council and the Lessee were resolved with a payment of an undisclosed amount in a confidential agreement. Council was now in 'vacant possession' of the Crystal Lake site.

By August 2012 most of the camp infrastructure had been removed and neglected buildings on the site had deteriorated. The community recognised the need to develop an agreed plan for the development of Crystal Lake. At a public meeting organised by the MCA on 1st November 2012, D Welsh from Battunga Country Tourism proposed a multipurpose 'Regional Art and Cultural Centre including a sculpture park' for Crystal Lake. This broad vision was unanimously agreed. To be continued.

Flu Vaccine FAQs

Flu vaccination & the Coronavirus (COVID-19)

Government advice is that the general public should receive their influenza shot as soon as possible. (Except if you are in Group 1A or 1B for COVID vaccination, in which case have your COVID vaccination first).

This is so there will be no interactions with any COVID-19 vaccinations and you will be protected from the Flu early in the season!

The Influenza (flu) vaccination is the most effective way for preventing and stopping the influenza virus from spreading. It is not 100% effective, but it can...

- keep you from getting sick with the flu
- for some, reduce the severity and complications of the flu if contracted
- be a good prevention for people with chronic health conditions
- reduce flu associated hospitalisations for all ages
- help protect women during and after pregnancy
- help protect those more vulnerable around you i.e. babies, older people and people with chronic health conditions.

Is the flu vaccine safe?

Each year the Influenza Vaccine Committee approves the use and composition of flu vaccines in Australia, as they vary from year to year. Flu vaccines in Australia do not contain any live viruses and stringent safety testing is conducted to ensure the new vaccine is safe for use. Your pharmacists at Meadows Community Pharmacy will also check your suitability for a flu vaccination prior to vaccinating you.

Why do I need to get a flu shot every year?

As the strains of viruses responsible for seasonal influenza change each year, the vaccine composition is modified, and therefore must be given annually to offer the best protection against the flu strains that are circulating at the time.

How long does the vaccination last?

In Australia, peak flu season is in the winter months, and the flu shot will normally provide you with immunity during this time. The Australian Government's Immunisation Handbook states that, "optimal protection is within the first 3–4 months after vaccination. Deferring vaccination to the beginning of winter may result in greater immunity later in the season, but may also result in missed opportunities for vaccination and lack of protection if the influenza season starts early".

I've heard getting the flu shot makes you sick - will it give me the flu?

This is a common misconception. There is no live virus in the vaccines used in Australia. In rare cases, if someone is exposed to the flu virus just before having their vaccination, it may still develop as the vaccine takes about two weeks to develop full immunity. Otherwise, if you get a runny nose, or a sore throat following your jab, you might have just had some bad luck and caught a cold, not the flu.

What is the National Immunisation Program?

The National Immunisation Program (NIP) is an Australian Government initiative that offers free vaccinations under Medicare at different stages of life, or to certain members of the community, such as pregnant women, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, and those with specific health conditions. To meet the anticipated demand for seasonal influenza vaccines in 2021, the Australian Government will be securing the largest supply of seasonal influenza vaccines ever through the NIP.

When should I get the flu shot?

The best time to vaccinate is in autumn, but the flu vaccine can be given at any time during the flu season while the vaccine is available. It is effective from 2 weeks post vaccination for approximately 4 months.

Who gives the vaccination?

Our specially trained pharmacists (Alyssa & Rachel) are able to administer flu vaccinations. In South Australia, pharmacists are now able to vaccinate people over the age of 10.

How long does it take?

The injection itself will be done before you know it, but it is recommended you stick around for about 15 minutes afterwards, so you can be monitored by pharmacy staff in the unlikely event of a reaction.

Are there any side effects or precautions?

Most people will just experience some soreness around the injection site, but some will also experience a mild fever, tiredness or body aches³.

For any mild side effects that are experienced, they can often be reduced by:

• drinking extra fluids, resting, taking paracetamol as per the instructions on the packet/bottle & not overdressing if you are already hot.

Depending on the severity, people with an egg allergy, including a history of anaphylaxis, can be safely vaccinated with the influenza vaccine. We recommend that you chat to your pharmacist to discuss your allergy.

If you are over 65s,

The Australian government funds the cost of vaccinations for people at high risk of influenza and its complications via the NIP. If you are over 65, you're eligible to have a free flu vaccination under the NIP at your local GP clinic.

The flu vaccine provided for people over 65 years of age is different to the vaccination provided to the rest of the population and is only administered in a GP clinic. This vaccine is adjuvanted, which means it is designed to boost the immune response and provide better protection for this age group. Supply of this vaccine will be available in April.

People over 65 can have the pharmacy based Quadrivalent vaccine, however it is highly recommended that they see their doctor to be assessed for any other medical conditions prior to receiving the adjuvanted vaccine.





CHERRY RIPE SLICE

INGREDIENTS:

250gms coconut

1 packet of glacé cherries

34 tin of condensed milk

125gms copha

250gms crushed malt biscuits

Icing or melted chocolate

METHOD:

Mix these ingredients together: 250gms coconut, 1 packet of glacé cherries (chopped) and 3/4 tin of condensed milk.

Then add 125gms melted copha (not hot) and 250gms crushed malt biscuits.

Mix well together.

Press into a flat dish.

Ice with chocolate icing or melted chocolate.

Keep in fridge.

COOK'S CORNER NANA'S PUMPKIN PIE

INGREDIENTS:

1½ cups cold steamed pumpkin

2 tablespoons melted butter, in milk

1½ cups scalded milk, hot

¼ tspn salt

1 cup sugar

½ tspn ginger

¼ tspn grated nutmeg

3 egg whites, stiffly beaten

1 tspn cinnamon

3 egg yolks, slightly beaten

Unbaked pastry shell

METHOD:

Combine the first 9 ingredients, mix thoroughly, then add stiffly beaten egg whites last, to give a chiffon-like texture.

Place in unbaked pastry shell and bake in a hot oven for 10 minutes.

Reduce heat to moderate and bake a further 20-30 minutes until firmly set.

Serve cold, with cream if liked.

LEMON SLICE

INGREDIENTS

125 gms butter

½ tin condensed milk (sweetened)

1 cup coconut

250 gms Marie biscuits, crushed

grated rind of 1 lemon


METHOD
