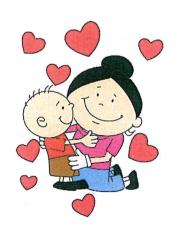

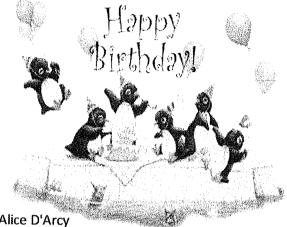

On 1st May we went back to The Day Paddock to remove Gorse seedlings that are germinating through the good native vegetation on the eastern side of the reserve. Thank you to the 11 volunteers who came out to help.



It is great to have some younger members of the community – Darcy, Alyssa and Hika - come out to help us. Much of the eastern side of the reserve is covered in a sedge named *Lepidosperma semeteres* Wire Rapier-sedge which often produces very little viable seed and is hard to propagate. It is therefore a very valuable asset in the reserve and very important to protect it from invasive weeds such as Gorse by removing any seedlings as soon as possible. We do this by carefully cutting the stem and dabbing with herbicide.

The native grasses have thrived where a large patch of Gorse was removed previously. It is important to leave any dead timber as habitat for any wildlife requiring shelter, food or perching points. Hopefully any dead trees will also remain standing to provide this habitat for decades or even centuries.

During the morning we had the support of Rohan Cleeves, the Regional Co-ordinator of the Trees For Life Bush For Life programme.



The large areas of Gorse sprayed last year have died but it was encouraging to see many native grasses, sedges and lilies emerging underneath the dead material. And we have been able to deal with the few weed seedlings emerging. 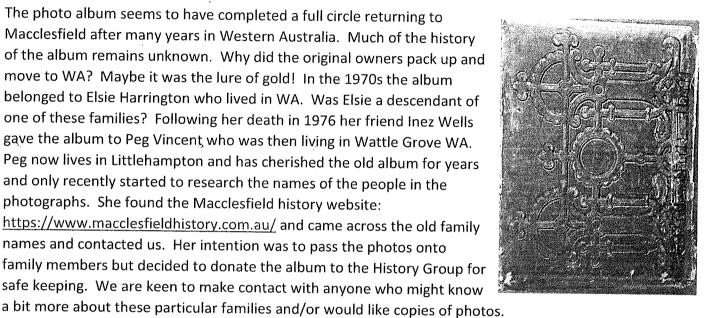

GLIMPSES OF THE PAST

Macclesfield Family Matters The Ellis and Pilben families and friends

Recently the History Group received a wonderful donation of an old family album complete with photographs of members of the Ellis and Pilben families who lived in Macclesfield around 1840 when the town was first settled. In 1875, the marriage of Richard Ellis and Ada Pilben brought together these two families.

The photo album seems to have completed a full circle returning to Macclesfield after many years in Western Australia. Much of the history of the album remains unknown. Why did the original owners pack up and move to WA? Maybe it was the lure of gold! In the 1970s the album belonged to Elsie Harrington who lived in WA. Was Elsie a descendant of one of these families? Following her death in 1976 her friend Inez Wells gave the album to Peg Vincent who was then living in Wattle Grove WA. Peg now lives in Littlehampton and has cherished the old album for years and only recently started to research the names of the people in the photographs. She found the Macclesfield history website: https://www.macclesfieldhistory.com.au/ and came across the old family names and contacted us. Her intention was to pass the photos onto family members but decided to donate the album to the History Group for safe keeping. We are keen to make contact with anyone who might know

Samuel Ellis and his wife Charity arrived in Adelaide in 1839 and soon took up a lease on a block in Todd Street, Macclesfield where they built a cottage and set up a business as shoemaker and also cultivated a 4-acre block and raised a few cattle and pigs. In 1849 they purchased sections 2780 and 2793 totaling 167 acres of farmland. Samuel joined the general exodus of male population in 1852 to seek a fortune on the Victorian goldfields (with some success) and returned to Macclesfield to continue farming and raising a family of 7 boys and 2 girls and also taking an active part in local council affairs.





Richard Ellis was their youngest son, born in 1854 and at the age of 21 he married Ada Pilben. They had 4 children Florence, James, Percy and Claude.

A History of the Pilben family compiled by Florence Briggs

Thomas and Sarah Pilben came originally from England but met here. Sarah arrived with her parents, William and Harriet Reeds and their other children on the 'Oleander' in January 1840 and Thomas was here prior to that. Later, they married in Holy Trinity Church, North Terrace, Adelaide, after which they settled in Macclesfield where Thomas built his house on his property of 92 acres on Section 2718 Hundred of Macclesfield. He also owned an acre in Venables Street. In the early days they grazed cattle and later turned the land, or part of it into a market garden. Eight children were born in the house, six of whom survived, namely: **Ada** see above, Harriet (Florence's mother), Lucy, Sarah, **Eva** and **William**. The family attended the Methodist chapel and received their early education at school in Macclesfield. After Thomas' death in the 1870's they moved to Young Street, Parkside, where they lived until Sarah died in 1892.

Included in the album are many other photographs, some named and others unidentified. There are several members of the Strutton family including Gus Strutton and AE Strutton (Sarah Pilben married Augustus Edwin Strutton of Thebarton on the 19th Nov 1890). Others include Frank Bonnett, Jean Roddick, Jessie Purcell and Caroline Hounslow with daughter Floss see above. (By 1924, Floss had married AK Strutton and given birth to a son, Bruce Arthur. Birth notice in Chronicle, 5 April 1924).

Considering the age of the photographs they are all in excellent condition, many are portraits from Photographic Studios in Adelaide and a number of them are **'Little Gem' tintypes**, which are about the size of a postage stamp and being quite robust could be sent by post or carried in a coat pocket. They were popular during the 1860s and 1870s and often produced by travelling photographers. The photographic emulsion was applied directly to a thin sheet of iron coated with a dark lacquer or enamel, which produced a unique positive image (ref. Wikipedia).

ULITINE ALLIANUL

FREIGHT BYPASS AND MORE AGED CARE FUNDING ARE KEY BUDGET PRIORITIES

A heavy vehicle bypass to ease congestion on the freeway and an additional \$9 billion for the aged care system are among the Federal Budget priorities for the Federal Member for Mayo Rebekha Sharkie.

The requests were outlined in a recent letter to the Prime Minister Scott Morrison and the Treasurer Josh Frydenberg ahead of the 2021/2022 budget next week.

"As a community we have successfully advocated for many projects in Mayo since I have been the Member for Mayo, but after many decades of infrastructure neglect, we are still playing catchup," Rebekha said.

"Last year the Government committed \$200 million for the Hahndorf Township Improvements and Access Upgrade, including \$15 million I advocated for to address the issues with the one-way freeway interchange at Verdun.

"However, freight and commuter traffic continue to increase on the South Eastern Freeway and recent heavy vehicle breakdowns have caused significant and prolonged traffic delays prompting public safety concerns in this high-risk bushfire region.

"So I have called on the Government to work constructively with the South Australian Government to develop and fund an infrastructure plan to improve safety and reduce congestion by diverting freight traffic movements from the South Eastern Freeway.

"Another key priority is aged care. Mayo is the oldest electorate by median age in South Australia and one of the oldest in the nation.

"The Government needs to heed the key recommendations of the Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety and contribute, at a minimum, an additional \$9 billion to the recurrent \$27 billion in annual funding to fund extra aged care packages and meet the cost of improving training and hands-on care.

"Any new funding needs to be subject to increased transparency and accountability in the sector and take into account the special circumstances in regional communities where providers do not have the economies of scale of larger urban-based providers.

"The Government also needs to set clear and measurable caps on administration fees for home care packages and I also called on the Government to consider the introduction of a voucher system for dental care for pensioners."

Rekekha's Federal Budget wish list also included a request to continue Supplementary Road Funding for South Australian councils; funding to upgrade high risk roads in the Adelaide Hills and funding for the extension of the Amy Gillett Bikeway as part of the Adelaide Wine Capital Cycle Trail project.

The Budget letter also requested more funding for mobile black spots; the automation of the barrages on the Murray River; support for the electric vehicle industry; tax relief for the craft distilling industry; investment in the seed potato industry on Kangaroo Island; funding for a food irradiation plant in the Adelaide Hills to control insects and invasive pests and support for a national fruit fly eradication strategy.

It was fantastic to hear from Penny that the Men's Shed have promised 3 benches to be placed alongside the walking track on the perimeter of Davenport Square as a part of the Healthy Town's Challenge project. The Lions are also jumping on board and will replace the old Lion's bench behind the skate space. The Primary School and Maccy Bush Care have offered their support in the seeking of another grant to further build on this project and develop our town's resources.



Robyn was tasked with the making of a wreath to be laid at the cenotaph in front of the RSL as a part of their ANZAC Day service. Congratulations to Dennis and the RSL on another wonderful ceremony. It was fabulous to see so many residents turn out for the event. I thought Roscoe's reading of the poem "In Flanders Fields" was the best I have ever heard.

The MCA contacted Council addressing the need for a *community emergency response plan*, something Council acknowledges that should be done as listed in their Macclesfield Township Plan. Council indicated that this needs to be community driven so we will start the ball rolling. Graeme will contact Meadows and Echunga Community Associations to see what they have in place and he has also talked to a few members of the local CFS. Keep an eye out for further information as it comes to hand.

COOKING FOR MOTHER'S DAY.

Giving Mum breakfast in bed is a nice idea for her special day and with plenty of mushrooms about at the moment, this recipe may be just the right things to try. If you don't want to do the scrambled eggs then mushrooms on toast is a great start to the day too.

Mushrooms with Scrambled Eggs and chives.

Preparation time: 10 mins

Cooking time: 10 mins.

Serves 4.

8 small (about 60g each flat mushrooms with stalks trimmed off

40 g butter, melted

8 eaas

½ cup cream or milk

1/3 bunch fresh chives, chopped

Salt & pepper, to taste

4 slices toast

- 1. Pre-heat a grill on high heat. Line a baking tray with baking paper.
- 2. Place mushrooms onto baking tray and brush both sides with ½ the melted butter. Place under grill and cook for 2-3 minutes on each side or until just tender.
- 3. Meanwhile, place eggs, cream or milk, chives, salt and pepper in a medium sized bowl and whisk until well combined. (You can leave out the chives.)
- 4. Heat remaining butter in a medium sized non-stick frying pan over medium heat. When butter is sizzling, add the egg mixture and cook a further 1-2 minutes or until egg just starts to set. Stir gently and cook a further 1-2 minutes or until cooked to your liking.
- 5. To serve, place 2 mushrooms on to each serving plate. Top with scrambled eggs and serve with a slice of buttered toast. Or put the mushrooms and scrambled eggs on top of the buttered toast and serve.

A recipe for a Mother's Day cake which experienced cooks may like to try.

Traditional Mother's Day Cake.

250 g butter
½ cup white sugar
1 teasp vanilla
2 tablesp marmalade
250 g glace peel
50 g blanched almonds
5 tablesp sherry or orange juice
1 ½ teasp baking powder
1 teasp mixed spice

1 ½ cups brown sugar grated rind of 1 lemon

5 eggs

200 g glace cherries

250 g sultanas

250 g raisins, chopped 2 ½ cups flour (plain)

pinch of salt 250 g marzipan

Line a 20cm round cake tin with baking paper.

Cream together butter and sugar; beat in rind, vanilla and marmalade. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add cherries, peel, nuts, dried fruit sherry or juice and half of the sifted flour and baking powder and mix. Fold in the remaining sifted flour and baking powder and mix well. Rollout the marzipan to about 22cm diameter (between two sheets of baking paper to make it easier).

Place ½ of the mixture into the tin and smooth down. Carefully place the marzipan into the tin and press it down, then place the remaining cake mixture on top of the marzipan.

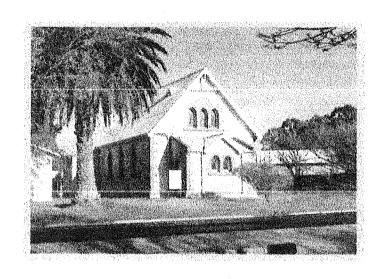
Bake at 150 degrees C for approx. 3 to 3 ½ hours until cooked when tested. Cool in tin. Decorate with icing or marzipan.

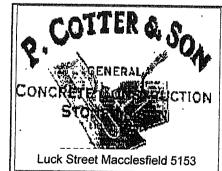
