Bushfire Last Resort Refuges

It is important not to confuse **Bushfire Last Resort Refuges** with a **Bushfire Safer Place**.

Bushfire Last Resort Refuges are your **LAST** choice of location to shelter from a bushfire.

A Bushfire Last Resort Refuge is a space or building which you could go to and remain in during a bushfire in your area.

It is an area that provides a **minimum** level of protection from the immediate life threatening effects of radiant heat and direct flame contact in a bushfire.

A Bushfire Last Resort Refuge is intended to provide a place of relative safety during a bushfire. It does **not** guarantee the survival of those who assemble there. You should only use a Bushfire Last Resort Refuge when your personal **Bushfire Survival Plans** cannot be implemented or have failed.



Risks associated with Bushfire Last Resort Refuges are:

- Travelling to a Bushfire Last Resort Refuge **may** be dangerous. Traffic congestion, fire activity, heavy smoke, accidents or fallen trees may block the route
- There is **no** guarantee that you will be safe from fire or radiant heat when travelling to or sheltering at a Bushfire Last Resort Refuge
- Emergency services **may not** be present
- There may be limited capacity
- Bushfire Last Resort Refuges **do not** cater for animals
- Bushfire Last Resort Refuges **do not** provide meals, amenities or special needs (e.g. for infants, the elderly, the ill or disabled)
- Bushfire Last Resort Refuges **may not** provide shelter from the elements, particularly flying sparks and embers.

A Bushfire Last Resort Refuge is **not** designed to replace a personal Bushfire Survival Plan.

You should complete and practise your **Bushfire Survival Plan** to ensure that you and your family are prepared and know what to do in the event of a bushfire.

Bushfire Safer Places

A Bushfire Safer Place is a place of relative safety. It may be used as a place for people to stay in or as a place of first resort for those who have decided they will leave high risk locations early on a high fire risk day.

Properties on the edge of these locations generally face a higher level of risk compared with those nearer the centre of the area. The relative safety of these properties can be improved by property owners undertaking **appropriate bushfire safety measures** to ensure they don't place themselves and the greater community at risk.

A Bushfire Safer Place is **relatively safe** from bushfire because:

- It is in an area of low levels of bushfire fuel
- It is far enough from continuous bushland or forest to reduce the risk of sparks and embers
- The bushfire will be interrupted by
 - established gardens and lawns
 - road networks and other low fuel areas
- There is likely to be access to emergency, health and other community services.

If your Bushfire Survival Plan includes relocating to a Bushfire Safer Place you should:

- Identify where your nearest Bushfire Safer Place is
- Identify where there are suitable alternatives
- Work out how you will get there
- Work out alternative routes to take
- Work out how long it will take you to get there
- Decide under what circumstances you will relocate
- Decide what your trigger points for action will be
- Plan for your relocation; when, where and what you will take

We recommend that if you intend to relocate to a Bushfire Safer Place you should do so early in the day. Last minute decisions to relocate in the face of fire are extremely dangerous.

Will you be safe in a Bushfire Safer Place?

There are no guarantees regarding your safety if you choose to stay in a Bushfire Safer Place or if you relocate to one.

It is unlikely you will be exposed to direct flame or severe radiant heat.

You may be exposed to spark, embers and smoke which may start secondary fires in vegetation, gardens and structures.

Even if your property is located within a Bushfire Safer Place you should prepare your home and undertake **appropriate bushfire safety measures** on your property.

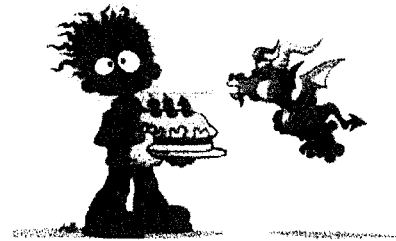

Now the fruit is all coming into season and jam, preserves, pickles and sauce making is in full swing again.

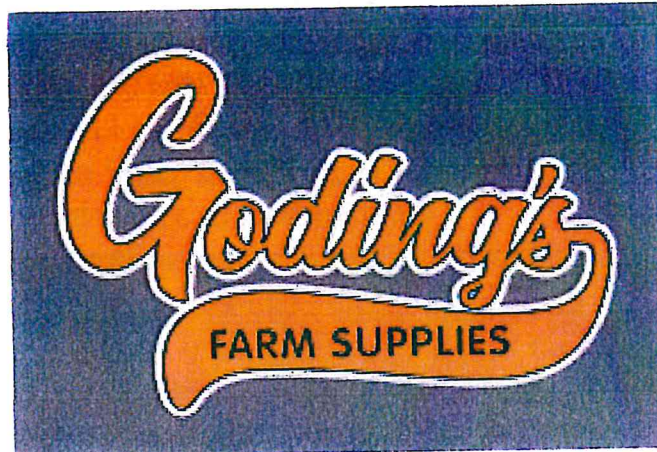

"A GLIMPSE OF THE PAST"

The Macclesfield Garage

Syd. Sawley and his family came to live here in Macclesfield in 1949, and settled in Shobbrooks Road.. Syd set up a mechanical repair business in Andrew Wright's shed in Kingrose Street, before buying a block in Venables Street and establishing a garage on what was the site of Talf Gooch's former Blacksmith Shop, the crenulated front was added at that time. Prior to this date, other workshops were at various places in the street and petrol was sold from the general store.

Syd. started a successful Austin dealership, and in 1952 Len Gillies and family came from Freeling and took over the Sawley business. Len had an Austin dealership in Freeling and continued on with the popular brand here. Between them Syd. and Len sold some of the first Austins in South Australia.

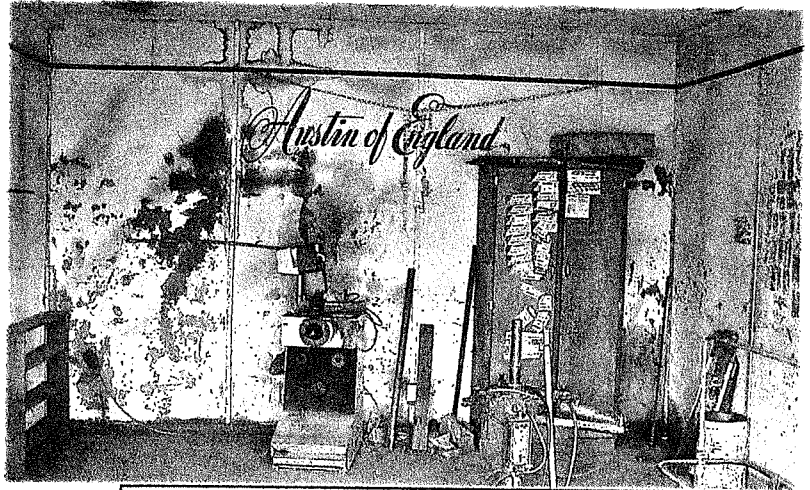
The cars arrived complete in large wooden crates, needing only petrol and a bit of a paintwork touchup and polish if necessary. Len also sold David

Brown Tractors and British motor parts as far a field as Wellington, Goolwa and Mount Compass. In 1954 Len transferred to the selling of Rootes Group vehicles, including the Hillman and Humber brands.

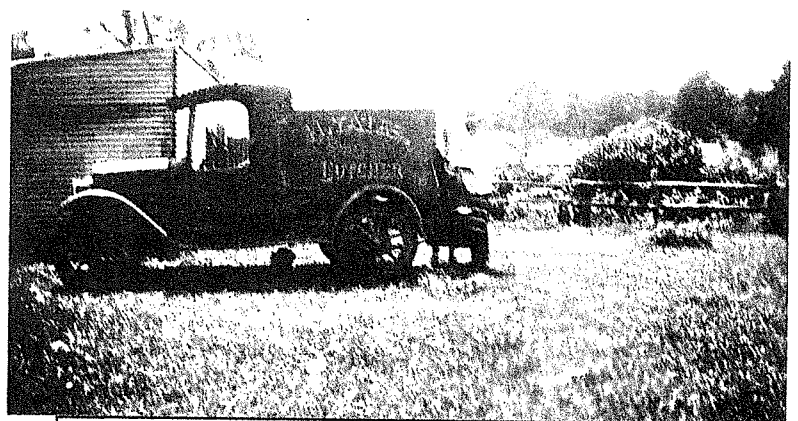
Len is now 84 years old and recalls some of the locals who bought cars from him during this time. Lance Bowey bought an Austin truck and later on a Humber Snipe car, Jack Williams and his father Alf bought Austins. Some of the locals he employed were Cyril Kroemer (who worked for both Syd and Len and later at the factory) Glen Boothby, Trevor Tonkin, Alf Williams, Mervyn Burgemeister, Vin Tonkin and Mary McCue as Secretary. Len also had a used car yard down in Adelaide and left here in 1957. One son Tony has a carrying business in Port Pirie and Len is involved in that too.

In earlier days Talf Gooch and his wife had lived in a galvanised iron house that was set sideways onto the block on the opposite side to the blacksmith's shop, with the house right on the front boundary. Father and son, Bob and Claude Smith, also lived there in the 1950's, but when Bob passed away, Claude moved to a small house next door to Bill Vaninetti's present home, and the Gooch house was demolished. Mrs

Gooch had developed a beautiful garden on the creek at the back and local residents were encouraged to wander there.

The Matschoss family, Albert and Dora, and son Colin, came to Macclesfield from Sherlock, and took over the business. They moved in over Easter 1957, first living in Wirrinilla Drive, then for a short time on the corner of Todd Street and Venables Street and then in the house on the corner of Todd Street and Searle Street until their home was built next to the garage in Venables Street in 1968. The Matschoss family became very involved with town life and activities, and held several positions on various committees.

Colin Matschoss left school in 1961 and worked at the garage with his father, commencing his apprenticeship by correspondence in 1963. He was the State's top apprentice in his first year and won various awards throughout the next years of his apprenticeship. The garage building has been enlarged during the years and at one stage the showroom held the latest Austin cars. Among others Lawrence Zecca bought an Austin Lancer and both Jack and Neil Wright bought Austins from them. One local recalls buying a car battery to use for their home radio set, and paying it off at 2/- a week.

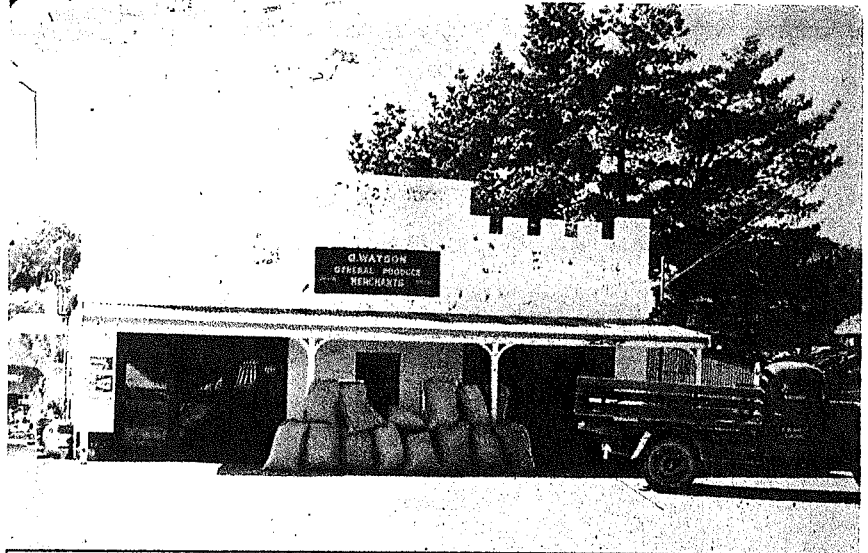
Colin remembers the State Centenary street gardens which were built from Yates Cottage to the front of the present site of the car hoist, and after they were removed a red rose bush persisted to flourish and bloom each Spring.

During the filming of the movie "Weekend of Shadows" here in Macclesfield, the front veranda was added to the garage and the petrol pumps were hidden behind bags of grain.

Colin Matschoss left the garage in 1995, the business was then run by Michael Stock (Stocky) until his departure in 2001, when Ian Deckert moved into the business.

The later photo shows the addition of the covered car hoist area and roller doors to the old show room and the hoist area.

Over the years the business has given employment to many, and helped provide apprenticeship opportunities to some of the younger men of the town.

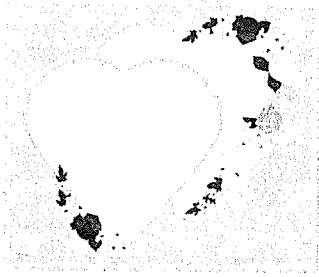


The garage during the filming of "Weekend of Shadows" in 1977 when the garage temporarily became Watson's General Produce Merchants.

VALENTINE'S DAY

14TH FEBRUARY

Valentine's Day or St Valentine's Day falls on February 14th each year and is the traditional day on which lovers express their love for each other. Valentine Cards, chocolates and flowers are often given or sent, sometimes anonymously.

Although there are varying opinions about the origin of the day and the details of the legends, it seems to be accepted that the day is named after one or two men both named Valentine who were Christian martyrs.

Valentine of Rome was a priest who suffered martyrdom for refusing to give up Christianity in about AD269. He was also a doctor who would treat patients even if they could not pay him and his miracle was curing a young girl of blindness.

Valentine of Terni was a bishop and was killed in about AD197. Some opinion has it that these two were one and the same person. Legend also has it that Valentine was put to death by the Emperor Claudius II who had outlawed marriages for young men, in order that they would be more willing to join his army. Valentine defied the order and continued to marry young lovers secretly until he was discovered.

Part of the legend records that when in goal awaiting death Valentine was befriended by the goaler's daughter and he left her a note signed "From your Valentine" and this message is repeated on many Valentine Cards today.

There is also opinion that the day has its origin in a Roman festival called Lupercalia when one of the traditional ceremonies involved placing the names of young women in a box from which they were drawn by the young men and the pair would then be partners for the duration of the festival.

The day became associated with romantic love in the Middle Ages when the tradition of courtly love flourished.

In England, Valentine's Day began to be popularly celebrated in the 17th or 18th Century and printed cards gradually became available with improvements in printing technology. However the earliest surviving Valentine is a poem written in 1415 by Charles, Duke of Orleans to his wife when he was being held in the Tower of London following the Battle of Agincourt. The poem is held in the British Museum.

In the United States, Miss Esther Howland is credited with producing and selling the first commercial Valentine's Day cards in 1847. Her father operated a large book and stationery store and she was inspired by receiving an English Valentine Card.

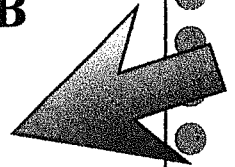
According to the Greeting Card Association, an estimated one billion Valentine Cards are sent each year!

CFS News

It's been a long time since the newsletter had an update from the brigade and, after a couple of gentle reminders from Geoff Horsnell, I have found time to write something.

The most recent event in the minds of the community will be the fire on Sunday 24th January that put a cloud of smoke in the sky that blocked out the sun and dropped burnt leaves all over Macclesfield. Luckily they had cooled down before they landed so we didn't have any incidents in the town. Fires behave in strange ways and some people think they creep up like a flood but they can arrive like burning snow in an ember shower so we must be prepared.

Many people have cleared gutters and raked up leaves but the most important preparation is to make a plan. If you plan to leave then you need to leave early because trees soon fall and block roads in a fire and being caught in a car when a fire front arrives is potentially fatal.

When we were standing by at the station on Sunday a number of people dropped in to ask if they should leave the town. That is a question we can't properly answer because it depends on who the person is, what their plan is, and what the fire is doing. Each person has to decide, for themselves, what they will do because we are going to be busy getting ready to put the fire out. Please think it through because only you can decide.

Some of you might decide to stay and defend your property but you really need to assess your premises and carefully assess yourself before you commit to it. We see firefighters succumb to heat stress and fatigue on the fire ground all the time so you need to be fit. Fires happen when it's hot but, without proper protection, you won't last long and that protection will make you hotter. Only you know if you can do it.

If you look at Macclesfield from a hill it looks like a lot of trees with houses in it and that means most of the town is potentially un-defendable. That means your street could be so hazardous that CFS trucks will not go into it in case they are trapped by the fire. It is a hard reality of firefighting that we cannot be everywhere and we cannot save everything so you cannot expect us to arrive and assist you if you have decided to stay and defend.

Another stark reality of being in the CFS is we don't have the option to stay at home and defend our own homes because we will be on trucks saving other people's houses so many of us have a plan for our families to leave early. One thing I do recommend you do is scan every photo you don't have in digital form onto a hard drive that you can pick up and take with you because losing your memories can be more upsetting than losing your house, as long as you are insured.

All of this advice is of a general nature and I only speak as the captain of your local brigade so, if you need more detailed information, go to the CFS website. If you don't have computer access or you aren't comfortable with computers, set up a contact with someone who is. That's where we get most of our information from so you can save yourself a trip to the station. That is also the place to find a five minute self-assessment of how defendable your property is.

You will be familiar with the siren as it works well to alert the public to go to the website to see what's going on. It will only be sounded for three reasons:

1. A test – usually at 7.30pm on Monday – sounded for about 10 seconds
2. A call for members that we are short of crew – for about 10 seconds
3. A warning the town is under imminent threat – constant

Reasons 1 and 2 are nothing to be concerned about but reason 3 is the sound we don't want to hear. That is not a warning to leave. If you haven't left by the time that sound is heard it would be very unwise to go on the road. It is a warning that a fire front is about to hit the town and, if you have decided to stay and defend, it's time to get ready.

All of this relies on a member of the brigade being available to press the button on the siren and we hope there will be someone there but we could all be out fighting the fire, if it's that close, so it can't be guaranteed.

I think I have said enough for now and I hope it has helped you to understand that the responsibility is on you to prepare properly and decide carefully so you can be safe. All of the members of Macclesfield CFS are volunteers with busy lives, committed to saving lives and caring for our community but we need you to play your part so we can play ours.

January's working bee fell on the same day as the planned Horse Show so we decided to work in the area set aside as native vegetation, behind the oval. When we arrived however, there were no horses to be seen! We decided that we would work along the strip of vegetation where the Gorse had been sprayed a few years ago, to remove any new seedlings which had germinated. There were also some small pine trees, plantain and weedy grasses which we removed. It was pleasing to see that there are lots of small native grasses and groundcovers thriving underneath the sprayed Gorse and that the shrubs such as *Hakea carinata* are recovering. Their mature, hard cones containing seed are food for the magnificent Yellow-tailed Black Cockatoo. The Kangaroo Grass in the area above this was flourishing and looking beautiful with its seed heads blowing the breeze. This had not been mown for the Horse Show but has since been slashed. We also had time to do a quick patrol through the SEB site removing Gorse seedlings and Plantain. We are discovering new species here all the time – this visit we found one *Acacia spinescens* Spiny Wattle. The only other specimen of this we have found locally is in Stone Reserve.

On Sunday 7th February we will be working at Crystal Lake – slashing grass, spraying weeds and hand weeding around native plants.
